Magic Words Opening

All of Our Friends

Materials:

Pencils copies of "All of Our Friends Chart"

Instructions:

1. Distribute a copy of the "All of Our Friends Chart" to each Cub Scout along with a pencil.



2. Explain that Cub Scouts will find 5 Cub Scouts and write their names in the left column (under "Name").

3. They will talk to the Cub Scout and find out about their hair color (and write it on the same line, but the 2nd column), their eye color (and write it on the same line, but the 3rd column), and their favorite food (and write it on the same line, but the 4th column).

4. Give the Cub Scouts a certain amount of time to complete the task of talking and finding out this information (10-15 minutes).

5. Lead the following discussion and ask the following questions:Did everyone you talk to have the same hair color as you? Eye color as you?Does everyone have the same favorite food? [Have some of them share what things they learned from each other.]

There are probably lots of other questions you could have also asked – like what's their favorite color or favorite game or favorite show on TV. We would learn more about how are friends are different, but that's OK. We can still learn to work together and play together even if we are not all the same.

Perfect Poinsettias

Materials

Flower/Leaf templates (1 per Cub Scout to trace) Red and green construction paper (1 sheet per Cub Scout)

Scissors

Pencil (for tracing templates onto colored paper and for punching a hole) Green chenille stem (1 per Cub Scout)

Glue

Small pieces of yellow construction paper rolled into small balls Pushpins (to help punch two holes)

Directions:

1. Cut out a flower/leaf template from the copied cardstock. Each Cub Scout needs one template to trace.

2. Trace the template 2 times on red paper and 1 time on green paper.

3. Cut out the flower and the leaf that have been traced onto the colored paper.

4. Glue the 2 flowers together. Position the flowers in such a way that the first

flower's petals stick out from the spaces in between the second flower's petals.

5. Glue the leaf behind the bottom flower. Position the leaf so that its points stick out from the poinsettia's petals.

6. Using a pushpin and a pencil, carefully poke two holes in the center of the glued poinsettia.

7. Bend your green chenille stem in half and pull it through the holes in the poinsettia.

8. Make 3 small pieces of yellow paper and roll them into 3 balls. Glue these balls onto the middle of the flower on top of the chenille stem.

9. Once the flower has dried completely, you can use

the chenille stem to attach your flower to almost anything as a decoration.
